It's true that since we launched
Simple Membership, using it for the
administration of a Group - which
ultimately simplifies the fee
collecting, email exchange and many
other Group communications seems very daunting and has actually
put off new and returning Group
Leaders from using it, or even forming
a Group.

The alternative to using it?

1. You can avoid hiring a venue.

This means that there will be no 'course costs' for members and admin can consist of no more than an exchange of email. Some of the smaller groups meet in a member's home and perhaps just pay a nominal cash amount for refreshments.

Other groups are always outside, such as the Social Cycling and Outdoor Sketching, while others avoid venue costs but incur separate costs, borne by the individual member at each meeting, such as the Film Club.

What if you really need a venue so have to charge for the sessions?

2. You could find someone within the Group do the admin for you.

There are clear User Guides on the website [Login, Member Area, SM User Guides, Guide for Group Leaders/ Administrators]. The Administrator could take on the administration regarding members and membership

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fees, and maybe send group emails, leaving the Group Leader free to organise the course

content.

NEW TO MAKING PRESENTATIONS?

Seasoned presenters have kindly offered these suggestions:

- Face the audience the whole time
- Rehearse your talk and time it, leaving
 10 minutes for questions
- 45 minutes is about the maximum attention span before a break is needed
- Get a critical friend to listen to it beforehand
- Ensure your technology works, check at least the day before
- If showing visuals, stand well to the side so as not to obstruct the view
- Avoid filling a screen with text—the audience has to read as the speaker is talking: both sources of information are impaired or lost.
